

HOPE AND FORGIVENESS

There were some interesting conceptions of sin prevalent in the time of the Hebrew scriptures. There was the belief that God punished sin immediately. Those who suffered disease or misfortune were, therefore, sinners getting their due from the Almighty.

Today's first reading hints at another kind of God. When David admits his sin, Nathan declares, "The LORD on his part has forgiven your sin" (2 Samuel 12:13b). TREASURES FROM OUR TRADITION

Last week's "Treasure" no doubt raised an eyebrow or two with the image of the deacons scurrying through the streets of Rome, or perhaps galloping on horseback, with fragments of eucharistic bread from the bishop's liturgy. These would be dropped into the chalice at outlying celebrations, presided over by presbyters, to express unity with the bishop, and perhaps also to remind the presbyters that they were not free agents. The Council of Laodicea forbade the custom of the *fermentum* in the year 348. Generally, one of the rules of interpreting law is that people don't make laws about things that aren't happening. So, by mid-fourth century, we have an important clue that what had once been a Roman custom had become widespread.

Interestingly, when the Church of England (and its related bodies) went through a liturgical renewal in the mid-nineteenth century, they reclaimed this custom from the mists of history. Today, it is the custom in some Anglican dioceses for a fragment of the host from the bishop's Holy Week liturgy (what we call the Chrism Mass) to be carried to every parish. On "Maundy Thursday" (our Holy Thursday), the fragment is dropped into the chalice to signify the parish's communion with the bishop. This modern revival of the *fermentum* is different from the "co-mingling" action we are used to, in which a fragment of the consecrated bread is dropped into the chalice just before Communion.

FROM THE PASTOR'S DESK:



Today we celebrate the Eleventh Sunday in Ordinary Time and tomorrow we celebrate the patronal feast of our parish, Saint Anthony of Padua. Clearly we come to the Eucharist each Sunday to be fed by the Body and Blood of Christ, sustained by this meal that is the "source and summit" of our faith, our very life in the Lord. So, while

we gather after Masses for a picnic, share a meal and conversation, watch young peo-

ple engage in games, you might ask: Who is our patron saint?

Who is Saint Anthony? Some of you may be very familiar with his life, for those who are not familiar with his life I will give you a brief overview from the Lives of the Saints. Saint Anthony was born in Lisbon, Portugal in 1195. As a very young man he decided to join the Canons Regular of Saint Augustine, but shortly after ordination to the priesthood, transferred to the Friars Minor (Franciscans) to devote himself to spreading the faith among African peoples. Due to an illness he was not able to pursue that dream. He returned to Italy where he spent much of his time in prayer, reading the scriptures and doing menial tasks. He had his greatest success, however, preaching in France and Italy and converting heretics. He was the first member of the Franciscans to teach theology to his brethren. His sermons are notable for their learning and gentleness. He died at Arcella, Italy on June 13, 1231.

From an excerpt of one of his sermons he preached these words on the feast of Pentecost: "The man who is filled with the Holy Spirit speaks in different languages. These different languages are different ways of witnessing to Christ, such as humility, poverty, patience and obedience; we speak in those languages when we reveal in ourselves these virtues to others. Actions speak louder than words; let your words teach and your actions speak. We are full of words but empty of actions...'

May our actions performed in faith, speak louder than our words, inviting others into the faith community, expanding our faith community to our friends and neighbors.

We also know that Saint Anthony is known as a "ready helper in time of need." Even to the extent of finding objects that are lost around the house or home. Some say, "Tony, Tony, turn around there is something lost that needs to be found." He also had a special love for the poor. Anthony was a preacher, teacher, healer and servant. We give thanks for his life, may his example inspire us to live our lives of faith. Happy Summer!
